# Global South asserts authority

# India leads call for fair global governance

## 16th BRICS summit opens up new reforms vista

The 16th BRICS Summit held in Kazan marks a pivotal moment in global geopolitics, as emerging economies, led by India and other nations in the Global South, assert a new vision for international cooperation. The Summit's outcomes signal a challenge to the current global order dominated by Western powers, offering instead a path to more inclusive multilateralism.

BRICS is definitely a new platform for addressing global issues in a peaceful way, without seeking domination, economist and analysts watching global governance issues feel.

This shift is underscored by the adoption of the Kazan Declaration, a document that sets forth a roadmap for reforming international institutions to better represent developing nations.

The gathering in Kazan highlighted India's role as a central player in

BRICS, as it championed a "people-centered" approach to global issues and reinforced the importance of Global South voices in shaping international governance. Prime Minister Narendra Modi emphasized the need to make institutions such as the United Nations, the International Monetary Fund, and the World Bank more inclusive, stating that developing countries should have greater representation and influence. This aligns with BRICS' broader push to make international platforms more reflective of diverse perspectives and less susceptible to the influence of singular power centers.

With India at the forefront, BRICS is positioning itself as a key force in addressing global challenges and rebalancing international influence. This shift is especially significant for the Global South, as

BRICS provides a robust platform for countries to advance economic growth, sustainable development, and equitable representation on the global stage.

India's advocacy for these reforms comes as BRICS gains traction as a credible alternative to Western-dominated organisations, especially among countries seeking solutions to debt relief, climate finance, and sustainable development. Nations across Africa, Asia, and Latin America, including newcomers such as Algeria, Uganda, and Nigeria, are finding common cause within BRICS as they push for a fairer economic and political order. For these countries, joining BRICS presents an opportunity to address issues traditionally marginalized in forums led by the Global North, which has often fallen short in areas like economic development

and climate action.

At the Summit, BRICS also strengthened its ties with the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) by adding Indonesia, Malaysia, Thailand, and Vietnam as partner countries, fostering a sense of regional solidarity.

Latin American nations such as Bolivia and Cuba have also increased their engagement, reflecting BRICS' appeal as a non-Western platform for economic cooperation and political alignment. This momentum underscores the Global South's growing influence as it seeks to reformulate the rules of global governance.

The Kazan Declaration, central to the Summit's outcomes, encapsulates BRICS' commitment to multilateralism and fairness in global governance, rejecting hegemonic control by any single power. The

document underscores an emerging multipolar world order, where countries of the Global South, including India, can shape decisions affecting their futures. Yet, this new orientation comes with challenges. With over 30 countries now expressing interest in joining BRICS, the organization faces the task of maintaining unity amidst diverse interests and backgrounds.

For India, the Summit was an opportunity to further its influence as a leader within the BRICS bloc and the broader Global South. By promoting "people-centered" governance and backing the Kazan Declaration's calls for

reform, India positions itself as a bridge between different emerging economies. At the same time, the expanded BRICS framework provides India with a platform to counterbalance Western influence without resorting to anti-Western rhetoric, aiming instead to foster a constructive dialogue on global issues. However, BRICS leaders are cautious not to let the association devolve into a purely oppositional stance against Western nations.

Western criticism of BRICS' expansion has been vocal, with some dismissing the Kazan Declaration as symbolic rather than substantive. BRICS leaders are thus

tackled with ensuring the association remains a constructive force, promoting a balanced international agenda without alienating or polarizing existing global partnerships.

As the Global South rises in influence, the outcomes of the Kazan Summit point toward a future where India and other BRICS members stand as primary advocates for reforming the international system. The expanding network of BRICS partnerships signals a new era in global governance, where emerging economies demand equitable representation and assert their collective aspirations

for a fairer, more inclusive world order. As we approach the final months of the first quarter of the 21st century, a new global order is emerging, with India and the Global South playing central roles. Historically, global power dynamics have shifted with each century: France was influential in the 19th century, Germany in the 20th, and post-World War II saw the formation of the United Nations under the leadership of the US and its allies, including England, France, Russia, and China. Today, however, a fresh balance of power is taking shape, largely shaped by the BRICS alliance.

India's role in BRICS signals a strategic advantage for the Global South, as countries look to bolster their positions within a multipolar world order. As BRICS gains influence and membership expands, its commitment to a fairer global governance structure promises a transformative impact on international relations.
